
On October 2 we talked about bullying. And there's quite a bit to say. We'd like to continue the conversation.

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

I also think it's the parent/guardian's duty to make sure they're meeting and conversing with other parents and helping build and maintain a network that will carry the family unit from elementary thru high school. This isn't only helpful when it comes to bullying, but to other things as well (eyes and ears when it comes to grades and projects, where kids say they're going, things they notice or hear with kids, help with half-days... even if they see a kid walking by themselves or not being picked up after school).
